

During the license renewal process, and as a result of FCC inspections, dozens of stations have received fines of \$10,000 or more for not having paid the appropriate attention to the requirements for a complete file. The debate over the online public file for television stations has also brought national attention to the broadcaster's public file obligation.

Engineering Internship Grant Program

The Broadcast Engineering Internship Grant program will connect "future" engineers to Wisconsin

broadcasters by funding a "Summer Engineering Intern" position right in your workplace! Up to five grants at \$2,500 for a two-month internship will be awarded to the cover internship stipend and expenses. Internships are to run from June 17-August 16, 2013. What will a Station have to do to participate?

- will a Station have to do to participate?
 - 1) Application is made to WBA by the station desiring the Grant
- 2) The station agrees that the Intern is to be assigned exclusively to Engineering/Technical Services Department
- 3) A check list of basic skills to be taught to the intern will be determined by the Station and presented to the WBA to aid in selection of candidates
- 4) The WBA Foundation Board will assess applications and match up selected stations with potential intern candidates
- 5) As part of the WBA's Assistance Action Plan for EEO Compliance, this program may be used as EEO Credit, as a non-vacancy specific outreach initiative.

Engineering Fellowship Grant Program

The WBA and the WBA Foundation appreciate those who have made the commitment and chosen "Broadcast Engineering" as a profession. We realize that you must stay current in Broadcast Engineering and that involves an investment of time and money in learning new technologies and practices.

As the broadcast industry evolves, so must our understanding of how to implement new media transmission. Unfortunately, busy schedules and tight budgets for most engineering departments often do not permit engineers to learn new skills and acquire understanding of new technology.

How are broadcast engineers able to keep up to date so that our industry thrives? The WBA and the WBA Foundation would like to provide an answer by offering Engineering Fellowship Grants. For the second year in a row, this program is meant to provide a stipend for "Senior" Broadcast Engineers serving Wisconsin member stations to acquire continuing

Broadcast Engineers will apply directly to the WBA. The WBA Foundation will award five \$1,000 Grants statewide. These grants are to be used for continuing engineering education such as courses in Information Technology/Networking, Engineering Leadership/Management, Electrical Engineering/Transmission Courses, or other "new technology" training. This is NOT to be used for trade shows but is rather intended for enrollment in continuing education courses, post-secondary education courses, or factory training on broadcast equipment. Travel expenses may be covered by grant monies.
